"Without a Self-Reliant Bihar, the Dream of a Developed India Remains Incomplete – Youth Hold the Key to Change," says Rituraj Sinha at Behtar Bihar Samwaad

CIMP, Patna hosts an engaging dialogue on Bihar's future

The Chandragupt Institute of Management Patna (CIMP) today hosted an evocative session of Behtar Bihar Samwaad, bringing together students, faculty, and thought leaders to deliberate on the state's development path. Shri Rituraj Sinha, National Secretary of the Bharatiya Janata Party and Group Managing Director of SIS Limited, was the keynote speaker.

Engaging directly with Bihar's youth, Shri Sinha underlined their pivotal role in shaping not only the state's destiny but also India's national aspirations. On the subject of employment, Sinha emphasised that an over-reliance on government jobs must give way to entrepreneurship and self-employment. Drawing a comparison, he said, "In Gujarat, young people start businesses at 18, while in Bihar many begin preparing for competitive exams at that age. If Bihar is to forge ahead, this mindset must change."

Expressing appreciation for CIMP, Sinha said he was heartened by the institution's constant commitment — through both faculty and students — to the idea of a Behtar Bihar. The session also saw active participation from students, who offered ideas on advancing agriculture through technology, expanding credit facilities for entrepreneurs, boosting tourism, and reforming minimum wage laws. Commending their contributions, Sinha noted, "This spirit of innovation is the very foundation on which a better Bihar will be built."
