Programs

Post Graduate Diploma in Management (PGDM)

The residential two-year full-time Post Graduate Diploma in Management (PGDM) prepares students for the corporate sector. The programme is designed to enhance the problem solving and decision-making capabilities of the participants. The programme creates awareness about the socio-economic environment and produces managers with socially desirable values.

During the first year of the programme, students learn basic concepts in the areas of Business Communication, Finance & Accounting, Marketing, Systems, Organizational Behaviour, Human Resource Management, and Operations & Quantitative Techniques. These core courses help the students in building a sound foundation in various functional areas. The programme offers a pool of electives in the second year in various functional areas of management such as Marketing, Finance, Human Resource Management, Operations and Business Analytics. A student can distribute his/her choice of electives across one or more of the functional areas, subject to completion of the minimum number of credits required for the award of PGDM.

Candidates appearing for CAT , XAT and CMAT are eligible to fill application for admission to two-year full-time residential Post Graduate Diploma in Management (PGDM) for the academic session 2024-26.

The total intake of students for the PGDM program (batch 2024-26) is 180.

Eligibility

The candidate must hold a Bachelor's degree with at least 50% marks or equivalent CGPA [45% in case of the candidates belonging to Scheduled Caste (SC), Scheduled Tribe (ST), and Differently Abled (DA)* categories] from a University incorporated by an Act of the central or state legislature in India or other educational institutions established by an Act of Parliament or declared to be deemed as a University under Section 3 of the UGC Act, 1956, or possess an equivalent qualification recognized by the Ministry of HRD, Government of India.

Reservation

The institute follows reservation policy, as prescribed by the Government of Bihar, for educational institutions. The break-up as per reservation policy is as follows: SC - 16%, ST - 01%, EBC - 18%, BC - 12%, Women of BC - 3%.

Amongst all the categories, 50% of the total seats would be reserved for students who qualify as a Domicile of Bihar (permanent residents only) and 4% of the total seats for Persons with Disability (PwD).

Fee Structure and Payment Schedule

Program fee for the PGDM batch 2024-26 is 7.65 lakh. Besides the program fee students must pay Mess, Hostel charges, and Books. All students must possess a Laptop.

Currently, CIMP is focused on shaping its next phase of growth, being increasingly relevant to all its stakeholders - especially, the industry. Briefly stated, our emphasis is on quality, foresight and preparedness so that we meet all these three sets of stakeholders' expectations. CIMP, through its academic rigour and focus, and its industry interface and corporate relations, strives to be relevant and in sync with the needs of the industry.

CIMP offers specialization in Marketing, HR and Finance, by offering elective courses in the second year. During 2017, CIMP joined hands with IBM Career Education, India to set up a Centre for Business Analytics and a Business Analytics Lab. IBM trained faculty from CIMP and IBM offer software driven courses in Business Analytics.

Admission PGDM Batch 2024-26

The admission process for PGDM at CIMP for the batch 2024-26 is completed. CIMP conducted the admissions GD-PI through online mode. A trial for the online process was done with all the applicants before the actual GD-PI to make the applicants use the online mode. All applicants were evaluated by the institute's faculty and judged for their intellectual capabilities to become successful managers in the corporate world. This year CIMP received applications from Bihar, Jharkhand, Orissa, West Bengal, Assam, Uttar Pradesh, Chhattisgarh, Tamil Nadu, Maharashtra, Haryana, and Delhi. A lot of students of Bihar currently pursuing undergraduate courses in other states have shown interest in joining the institute in their native state.

The offer has been given to 180 candidates to join CIMP for the PGDM batch 2024-2026.

Post Graduate Diploma in Management in Innovation, Entrepreneurship and Venture Development (PGDM-IEV)

The Post Graduate Diploma in Management in Innovation, Entrepreneurship and Venture Development (PGDM-IEV) is a full-time academic program designed to enhance the business capabilities of the participants and prepare them to start their own enterprise. This unique program offers pre- incubation hand holding, live product/service development, proof of concept (PoC) testing, compliance fulfilment, IPR management and product commercialization under one umbrella. Participants will come up with their own company by the time of completion of their degree.

PGDM-IEV course has five Modules, two Action Learning Segments and three Capstone Projects to enable students to learn to recognize, create and shape a business opportunity, develop leadership and build a start-up team construct business model, and assess market feasibility for launching new start- ups.

Eligibility

The applicant must have a bachelor's degree from any University/Institution recognized by the Ministry of Education, Government of India. Candidates with experience in startups, businesses or other relevant work experience will be given preference.

Candidates having a valid score of CAT/ XAT/ GMAT/ CMAT/ MAT/ ATMA are eligible to apply.

Selection Process

Shortlisting will be done based on the candidate's academic record, work experience and Statement of Purpose outlining their interest in the programme. Shortlisted candidates will be asked to appear for a personal interview.

Fellow Program in Management (FPM)

Chandragupt Institute of Management Patna (CIMP) is one of the youngest institutes in the country to offer AICTE approved Fellow Program in Management (FPM). Currently CIMP is offering FPM in the areas of Economics, Marketing, Finance & Accounting, Production & Operations Management.

About the Program

The full-time residential Fellow Program in Management (FPM) is designed to enhance research capabilities of the participants and prepare them for research, academics, and consulting roles.

Course Structure

FPM is a full-time residential program. The specialization. From the third year onwards, the candidate is expected to complete the course work FPM participants start independent research work and thesis in 4 years.

The first year of the FPM Program will commence with the Post Graduate Program in Management (PGP). FPM participants must complete all the courses taught to PGP participants in the first year. During this period the participants learn basic concepts in the areas of Business Communication, Finance & Accounting, Marketing, Organizational Behaviour, Human Resource Management, Systems, and Operations & Quantitative Techniques. These core courses help the students in building a strong foundation in various functional areas.

In the second year, participants will be taught courses related to Research Methodology, Managerial Statistics, Systems Approach to Management and General Management along with core area courses. The second-year courses prepare FPM participants to conduct research work independently in their area of specialization. From the third year onwards, the FPM participants start independent research work under the supervision of a Guide and Research Advisory Committee.

Admission Procedure

Candidates require a valid test score, from any one of the acceptable tests (CAT, GMAT, GRE, NET). The candidates must submit a synopsis of about 5000 words on the area of their research interest (tentative research proposal) along with his/ her application. Every candidate must make a presentation before the selection committee. Shortlisting of the candidates will be done based on Test scores (CAT, GMAT, GRE, NET), previous academic record, relevant work experience and the quality of presentation. Shortlisted applicants will be called for Research Proposal Presentation and Personal Interview (PI). Applicants will be informed about the Research Proposal Presentation and Personal Interview (PI) schedule by email.

The final selection of the candidate for FPM admission will be based on the cumulative score consisting of the following parameters:

- Academic qualifications [20 percent]
- CAT/GMAT/GRE/NET [20percent]
- Research Proposal Presentation before the Selection Committee [40 percent]
- Personal Interview [20 percent]

Eligibility

The candidate must hold a master's degree [or equivalent in Engineering / Technology / Management / Economics / Social Science / Biological Science / Pure Science / Commerce / Humanities] with above 50% marks or equivalent CGPA from a University incorporated by an Act of the central or state legislature in India or other educational institutions established by an Act of Parliament or declared to be deemed as a University under Section 3 of the UGC Act, 1956, or possess an equivalent qualification recognized by the Ministry of HRD, Government of India. Foreign applicants having master's degree with above 50% marks or equivalent will also be considered.

Candidates appearing for the final year of master's degree / equivalent examination and those who have completed degree requirements and are awaiting results can also apply.

Prospective candidates must maintain a valid email account and valid phone number throughout the selection process. CIMP will not be responsible for non-delivery of messages if the email address and phone number given in the application form are invalid / changed later.

Though CIMP uses CAT scores for short-listing the candidates for Fellow Programme in Management, the IIMs have no role either in the selection process or in the conduct of the Program.

Financial Support

Scholarship and Facilities

All selected candidates are eligible for CIMP Fellowship. A fellowship of Rs. 20,000/- per month will be provided for a period of 4 years to the admitted candidates. All the FPM candidates will be provided accommodation within the campus. Each candidate must pay the mess bill and study material charges.

FPM students will have access to the library and other academic resources available at CIMP.

As a part of the program, fellow students will be allowed to attend one international and two national academic conferences.

Placements

Final Placements Batch 2023-25

Chandragupt Institute of Management Patna (CIMP) was successfully conducted within the designated placement window from September 2024 to March 2025. The process enabled students to pursue career opportunities aligned with their preferred sectors and functional areas.

A total of 116 dream applications were recorded during the 2025 placement season, reflecting the institute's student-centric approach. The successful completion of the recruitment cycle for all 116 students is a strong testament to the high calibre of the student cohort and the robustness of the placement framework, which offers ample flexibility to both students and recruiting organizations.

The Placement Process at CIMP Patna is a Structured and Student-centric initiative aimed at facilitating meaningful career opportunities.

The Placement Season at Chandragupt Institute of Management Patna (CIMP) typically commences from the month of September each year. Prior to this, students are thoroughly briefed about the placement process and protocols and are required to formally acknowledge and sign the Placement Norms Document, making them eligible to participate in the placement process.

The students undergo pre-placement training that includes resume building, aptitude sessions, skills development, mock interviews, and group discussions. The process formally commences with the invitation of recruiters and the blocking of the academic calendar for final placements. As part of the process, a Placement Brochure is designed for circulation. Comprehensive student profiles and academic data are collected and mapped to company-specific eligibility criteria and hiring requirements. Accordingly, eligible students are invited to apply to relevant companies. Most placement drives are conducted on campus, although virtual and hybrid formats have also been successfully hosted to accommodate recruiters' preferences.

The process includes Pre-Placement Talks, Assessments, Group Discussions, and Personal Interviews, coordinated smoothly by the Training & Placement Cell with active support from the Placement Committee team of student representatives playing a proactive role in drive execution and corporate coordination. Once a student receives an offer and the results are officially declared, they are considered 'Placed' and blocked from appearing in subsequent drives, in adherence to the institute's "One Student - One Job" Placement Norm, ensuring fairness and equal opportunity for all.

Top Recruiters

The 2025 final placement process at CIMP saw active participation from 52 reputed organizations, offering approximately 41 distinct roles across various domains, including Pre-Placement Offers (PPOs).

Among the participating firms, ICICI Bank and Asian Paints emerged as the top recruiters.

- ICICI Bank led the recruitment drive with a total of 25 offers, including PPOs.
- Asian Paints followed closely, extending 10 offers to students during the process.

The diversity and volume of offers reflect the strong industry connect of the institute and the trust recruiters place in the talent and professionalism of CIMP students.

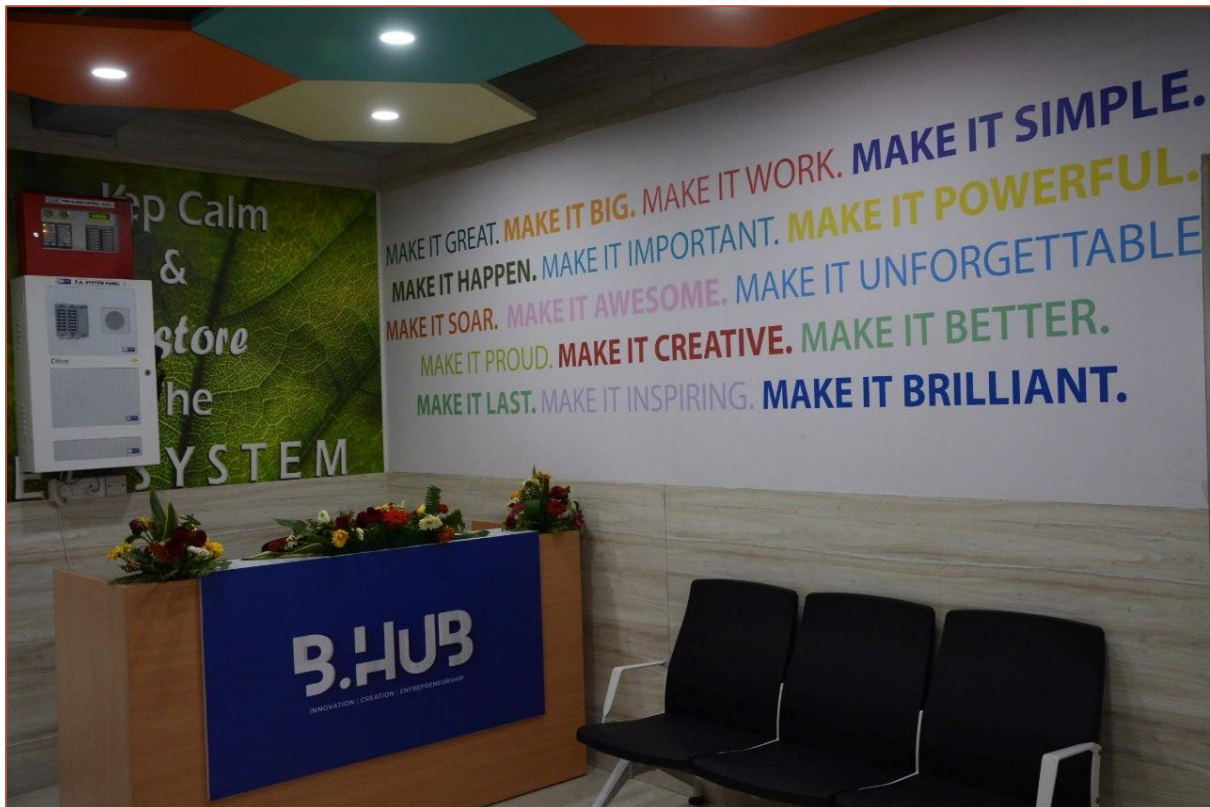

Schedule-Significant Accounting Policies

1. Basics of Preparation of financial statements:

The financial statements are prepared in accordance with Indian Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP) under the historical cost convention on the accrual basis of accounting and Accounting standard as Notified by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India.

2. Use of estimates:

The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with IGAAP requires the board to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of revenue and expenses of the year, reported balance of assets and liabilities and disclosures relating to contingent assets and liabilities as the date of the financial statements.

Accounting estimates could change from year to year. Actual results could differ from those estimates. Appropriate changes in estimates are made as and when the board becomes aware of changes in circumstances surrounding the estimates. Any revision to accounting estimates is recognized prospectively in current and future periods.

3. Fixed Assets:

Fixed assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and impairments, if any. The cost of acquisition of fixed assets is inclusive of duties and taxes and other incidental expenses, which are directly related to the acquisition of the assets & bringing the assets to its working condition for intended use. Borrowing costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition, consumption or production of qualifying assets is capitalized as part of the cost of the assets.

Fixed assets received by way of non-monetary grants (other than towards the corpus funds) are capitalized at values stated by corresponding credit to capital fund.

4. Depreciation

Depreciation of fixed assets is completed on the basis of Written Down Value Method (WDV) as per the rates specified under the Income Tax Act, 1961, However following assets has been depreciated 100%.

- I) Journal
- II) Database Account
- III) Anti-Virus



5. Revenue Recognition

Revenue is primarily derived from collection of fees from the students and from the return on investment made. The recognition depends on the certainty of collection and in case of service on consumption of the services and certainty in ultimate collection.

A. Revenue from operational activities: -

a. Collection of fees from the students is accounted on accrual basis. However, during the year Tuition fees are Rs. 11.32 CR which has increased by Rs. 1.09 CR approx.

b. Interest Income on investments is recognized on time and proportion basis.

c. In relation to other incomes like income from Service /Consultancy/Professional activities/ research projects the revenue recognition is on completion of the milestones set or on predestined periodicity and based on certainty of its realization.

6. Government Grants

The Institute recognized grants only when there is reasonable assurance that the conditions attached to them shall be complied with and grant will be received. Government grants related to depreciable fixed assets are treated as deferred income and are recognized in the Statement of Income and Expenditure on a systematic basis over the useful life of the assets.

In the case of grants, other than Government grants the grant is recognized based on the certainty of collection.

Grant if related to specific project/purpose are credited to the project account and related expenditure is reduced from the Grant and balance is shown under current liabilities to the extent of utilized grants. Expenditure made in excess of the received are disclosed as Receivables. Any surplus of the project is transferred to the restricted fund.

Other revenue Grants are credited to the other income in Income & Expenditure account.

7. Contingent Liabilities

1) Retirement Benefits

Gratuity: The Institute has taken an insurance policy under LIC Group Gratuity Scheme. During the current financial year, no any provision for retirement benefits has been made. Adequacy or otherwise yet to be ascertained.

8. Designated/ Earmarked Funds

The Institute has created the long-term fund as earmarked for the specific purpose.



a. Gratuity Fund

These funds are utilized as per the recommendations of Management Committee of Endowment Fund from time to time duly approved by BOG. The Income from Interest in such deposit is recognized on accrual basis and is ploughed back and credited to earmarked funds.

Schedule-Notes on Accounts

1. Previous Year's figures have been grouped / re-grouped /arranged/rearranged wherever necessary to bring them in conformity with current year's figures.
2. The proper supporting vouchers in respect of expenditures were available with vouchers authenticated and kept by the management.
3. Net surplus (Excess of Income over Expenditure) on account of different projects were transferred to project fund in the Balance sheet, as separate financial statements of these project were prepared and were audited by the respective auditors, wherever necessary.
4. Capital Fund includes the amount of interest earned since beginning on grant received for Building; it is available for the Capital Expenditure.
5. On some occasions, expenditure has been made in cash with the approval of the Management.
6. The Institute is providing exempted service in terms of educational services to student and providing taxable services in terms of executing different programs /projects.
7. The income of the Institute is exempted under sec 10(23C) (iiiab) of the Income tax Act, 1961. The Institute was recognized as "Wholly Charitable Society" and granted registration under Section 12A(a) of the Income Tax Act, 1961.
8. The Professional Expenditure has increased from Rs. 58.75 lakhs to 86.42 lakhs due to ensure compliance with statutory mandate of associating the Professors of Practice.
9. In Calculation of Application of Funds, the Management has decided to apply the Depreciation amount instead of addition of amount In Fixed assets.
10. Seminar, conference /workshop & FDP expenses have increased from Rs. 8.24 lakhs to 18.80 due to the HR Conclave (for strengthening the placement of students), ICPPM for policy research and events mandated by NITI Aayog for conducting events by CIMP as lead knowledge Institute of NITI Aayog.
11. During the Financial Year 2024-25, the Institute has taken GST Input on the basis of Monthly ratio of exempted and taxable services.



12. The CIMP received ₹ 5,00,000 from the father of an alumnus pending the creation of CIMP Alumni Trust in the previous year. CIMP established the CIMP Alumni Scholarship Trust and created corpus of Rs. 10 Lakhs by making additional contribution of Rs. 5 Lakhs to provide scholarship to meritorious students on merits cum needs basis.
13. PGP Books Expenditure has increased due to more books being purchased due to increased number of PGDM Students.
14. Change in rates of depreciation

Prior to 1st April 2024 depreciation was charged based on the useful life of the assets. For better acceptance of depreciation charged by the statutory authority's depreciation rates as recommended by the Income Tax Rules 1961 Appendix 1 has been adopted w.e.f current financial year i.e. Technical Know-how, Books, and Computer Peripherals.

Change Rates as per Income Tax Rules, 1962 (Appendix I):

- Technical Know-how (intangible asset): Depreciation @ 25% (Block: Intangible assets such as know-how, patents, copyrights, trademarks, licenses, franchises, or any other business or commercial rights of similar nature).
- Books (other than annual publications): Depreciation @ 40%.
- Books (annual publications): Depreciation 100%.

Computer Peripherals (including printers, scanners, etc.): Depreciation @ 40% (treated at par with computers)


